- Staff expressed that this presentation was to show the progress so far which was mainly collecting information from staff, outreach, and conducting and pulling together the needs assessment.
- Commissioners asked staff and bluepoint to consolidate the presentation that will go to council in December to get to the progress happening and expectations for the final draft preparation.
- Smithers asked questions on the Park opportunities and clarification on areas the open spaces are located. Additionally with a top priority of making these trails already used by residents become formal trails in the St. Helena.
- Commissioners asked if bluepoint can come back prior to council to review the revised presentation.
- Staff expressed the master plan is composed of a lot of data as well as what could be done in the future. It is the staff's job to determine the priorities of the projects and funding opportunities for it.
- Commissioners gave suggestions for staff to give back to Bluepoint regarding their council presentation.

Frequently Asked Questions

St. Helena Parks & Recreation Committee
December 8, 2025

Overview

In 2011, Mayor Dell Britton authorized the planting of an experimental timber forest of coast redwood trees on unused City of St. Helena land in the County, south of the wastewater treatment facilities off Chaix Road. Over the past fourteen years, this work has grown into the Napa Valley Community Forest—an ecological, educational, and community resource managed by Sustainable St. Helena. The Community Forest currently hosts 2,000 coast redwoods, 80 dawn redwoods, and 200 valley and coast live oak trees.

Sustainable St. Helena now requests:

1. Approval to expand the forest from 16 to 37 acres on fallow, non-developable City-owned floodway land; and
2. Authorization of a Conservation Easement (CE) with the Land Trust of Napa County, permanently protecting the Community Forest acreage.

See Appendix A for maps showing the current 16-acre forest and Appendix B for the proposed 37-acre expansion.

Why a Conservation Easement Is Needed Now

- Permanently protects the land from future development.
- Formalizes fourteen years of City-supported, community-funded work.
- Provides long-term ecological, recreational, educational, and climate benefits.
- Ensures land remains dedicated to habitat restoration and community use.
- Creates eligibility for regional and state climate funding.
- Recent upgrades at the wastewater treatment facility have reduced the City's reliance on the southern portion of the land.

Conservation Easement 101

- The City retains full ownership of the land.
- A legal agreement between a property owner and the proposed holder that restricts and/or prohibits specific development rights.
- Perpetual in duration, under California Civil Code 815.
- Crafted specific to the property, based on current and planned uses.
- Preserves the conservation intent of the property owner in the face of external pressures or threats.
- Annual monitoring by CE holder to ensure compliance.
- Land Trust of Napa County current portfolio of 161 conservation easements, including 2 on City of St. Helena property and 16 other government-owned properties.

Financial Commitment and Community Investment

Sustainable St. Helena has raised over \$200,000 to plant, irrigate, and manage the existing forest—at no cost to the City. This demonstrates strong local support, stewardship capacity, and long-term investment.

Sustainable St. Helena plans to continue fundraising efforts for long-term stewardship and management of the Community Forest, including monitoring costs for the conservation easement. The only financial costs to the City for the conservation easement include: staff/counsel review of negotiation documents; and staff time to confer access for annual Land Trust monitoring visits.

How the Community Forest Supports the Napa County Regional Climate Action Plan (RCAAP)

The draft Napa County RCAAP requires each municipality to increase tree canopy above 2019 levels. The Napa Valley Community Forest is the largest single contributor to St. Helena's canopy growth:

- Over 2,000 new trees planted since 2019.
- An additional 4,000 trees possible with the 37-acre expansion.
- Supports the Urban Forestry & Nature-Based Carbon Sequestration strategies outlined in the RCAAP.

Alignment with the St. Helena Master Walking Path Plan

The forest lies along the alignment of the City's Master Walking Path Plan.

- Creates a continuous public walking and nature trail.
- Connects to the proposed Napa River Trail.
- Provides community recreation, wellness, and open space benefits.

Accomplishments to Date

- 16 acres planted with over 2,500 trees including redwoods, oaks, ash, and buckeyes.
- 160 additional trees and shrubs planted in partnership with NRCS and Napa RCD.
- Drip irrigation installed to prevent effluent drift.
- Maintenance supported by Silverado Farming and community volunteers.
- Forestry oversight provided by three Registered Professional Foresters.

Environmental Benefits

The Napa Valley Community Forest provides significant environmental benefits that expand meaningfully with the proposed 37-acre expansion:

- Carbon sequestration: approximately 250 tons of CO₂ removed annually at maturity.
- Long-term carbon storage exceeding 4,410 tons across the expanded forest.
- Floodway enhancement: improved water infiltration, lower runoff velocity, and strengthened Napa River corridor function.
- Biodiversity: enhanced habitat for birds, pollinators, and native species—including occasional sandhill cranes and egrets.
- Air quality and heat-island mitigation: shade canopy lowers temperatures and improves local air quality.
- Soil improvement: redwood and oak litter builds organic matter and improves soil structure.

The expanded forest strengthens climate resilience, improves watershed health, and supports long-term ecological stability within the Napa River system.

Why Redwoods?

- Ideal soil and climate conditions.
- Strong health observed among redwoods planted over 30 years ago.
- High fire and climate resilience.
- Excellent carbon sequestration capacity.
- Regenerate naturally after harvest; no replanting required.
- Tolerant of treated effluent in well-drained soils.
- Native to Napa County.

Carbon Sequestration Benefits

A sustainably managed redwood forest with an average age of 20 years stores approximately 210 tons of carbon per acre. The 21-acre expansion would provide:

- 4,410 tons of carbon stored in a steady state.
- Approximately 250 tons of CO₂ removed annually once fully established.

Challenges

- Seedling stress due to heat, frost, wildlife, and competition.
- Treated effluent availability is limited to 3 times per week.
- Some native species are salt intolerant, but redwoods and oaks perform well.

Tree Spacing and Harvest Plan

- 200 trees planted per acre.
- Thinned to 100 trees per acre after 15–20 years.
- Selective harvest of ~20% every 5 years beginning in year 20.
- Creates a sustainable multi-aged forest.

Timber Revenue Sharing

Timber harvested from the forest will be selectively removed under Registered Professional Forester supervision. Net revenues will be shared 50/50 between the City and Sustainable St. Helena after the nonprofit recovers its direct capital costs.

Project Leadership

Project Director Paul Asmuth holds a Master of Science in Forestry and oversees operations alongside three Registered Professional Foresters:

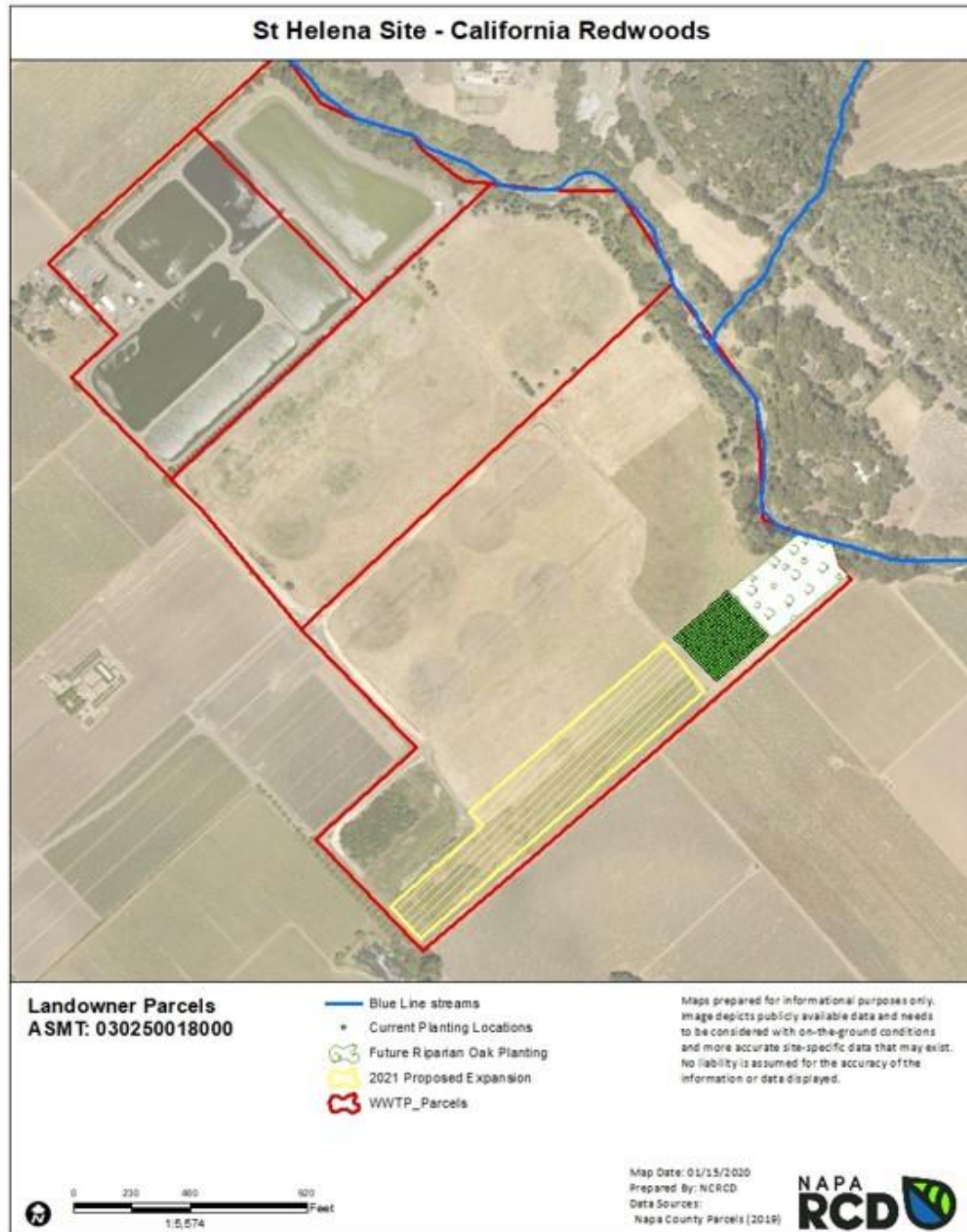

Lena Pollastro is the Conservation Director for the Land Trust of Napa County, on staff for over 18 years. She supervises all new conservation acquisitions as well as the monitoring and compliance program for the organization.

Summary Request

- Approve expansion of the Napa Valley Community Forest from 16 to 37 acres.
- Authorize a Conservation Easement with the Land Trust of Napa County.
- Secure permanent open space, climate resilience, and community benefits with no additional City staffing.
